# Pilmoth Patuxet Museums Video Series

Plimoth Patuxet Museums received a grant from the LILLY Endowment Inc (of the Lilly Corporation) the complex worldviews and beliefs that were central to the people who lived, traded, worked and worshipped along the historic shores of change in Massachusetts during the 17th Century. The name of the Series is "The Light Here Kindled" These films are just now being offered for use by all of us.

"The Light Here Kindled" is divided into four sections, each contains 3-4 films. For example, sections "Life Passages" and "Communities of Faith"give an overview of the Pilgrim experience through the story of Mayflower passenger Stephen Hopkins and his family.

The Historical and Cultural Society of Clay County is located in the Hjemkomst Center, Moorhead, MN. On a recent visit I was browsing the gift shop when I came across a book whose title drew my attention. "History Smasher The Mayflower" by Kate Messner, illustrations by Dylan Meconis. The book's synopsis: "In 1620, the Pilgrims landed at Plymouth Rock and made friends with Wampanoag people who gave them corn. RIGHT?

WRONG! It was months before the Pilgrims met any Wampanoag people, and nobody gave anybody corn that day. Did you know that the pilgrims didn't go straight from England to Plymouth? No. they made a stop along the way—and almost stayed forever! Did you know there was a second ship, called the Speedwell. that was too leaky to make the trip? No joke. And just wait until you learn the truth about Plymouth Rock. Through illustrations, graphic panels, photographs, sidebars, and more, acclaimed author Kate Messner smashes history by exploring the little-known details behind the legends of the Mayflower and the first Thanksgiving."

As far as I can tell this information is historically correct, (the good and the bad), stating primary and secondary sources. It says it is written for ages 8-12 years but I found it to be interesting for older readers as well. Let me know what you think.

### FROM THE GOVERNOR'S DESK

Thanksgiving 2025

Next year Americans will celebrate the 250 Anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence. This document, along with the Bill of Rights, set the foundational ideas for American governance, emphasizing self-rule and the protection of individual rights. 156 years before this signing, another document was signed. One that would change the course of history. Because the Mayflower Pilgrims were settling in a location where no one was in charge, they saw the need to have a written agreement. This agreement, later known as the Mayflower Compact, set forth a promise that the Pilgrims would work together and follow laws they set for themselves. They elected a governor and created a government, of the people, by the people, and for the people. The Compact emphases self-rule and the protection of individual rights such as freedom of Religion and the press and the right to peacefully assemble. The Compact provided for the common defense and promoted the general wellbeing of all. All men were considered equal and as they signed the Compact, the men promised to support and follow these ideals.

The Mayflower Pilgrims were the first Englishmen to permit Widows to inherit their husband's land and personal property. They also provided for orphaned children.

The Mayflower Pilgrims and the Wampanoags proved that people from different backgrounds and cultures could come together peacefully to support each other.

- Preserve and maintain the highest genealogical standards proving the lineal descent from the 1620 Mayflower Pilgrims.

# THE "FIRST" THANKSGIVING

Often there is some confusion about "The First Thanksgiving". Hundreds of years before the arrival of the Pilgrims on the Mayflower, humans around the globe had been giving thanks through gatherings and celebrations for bountiful harvests. In 1621 the Mayflower Pilgrims gave thanks for their harvest with a celebration. They invited their neighbors, the Wampanoags, to thank them for their help throughout the year. Today, many of the traditions passed down by the Pilgrims of holding celebrations and gatherings with family and friends hold true. It was not until years later that this gathering was termed "The FIRST Thanksgiving" by historians.

There are 62 Life members who we pay \$35 each to Plymouth. We do ask them to donate this amount. Joy Grinnell moved to pay the usual bills. Cindy Huffman seconded and the motion was approved. The audit committee met and found the books to be in order.

### **DGG's Report**

DGG Marti Bobertz presented on the National Meeting held in September 2025 in San Antonio, TX. (she did not attend in person)

Day one was tours of the area. Day two was the business meeting, awards, appointment of a new Member At Large, Bylaw updates including allowing electronic meetings will be voted on next year. Voting only happens in the 3rd year. That meeting will be in Plymouth in 2026. The first weekend after Labor Day.

#### The Historian's Report

Cindy Huffman said four applications and one supplemental were done. Two transfers from other states. Two more supplementals in process. Mary Verlinde did resign as Assistant Historian.

# **Education Report**

Sandy Roe reported presenting to a 1st grade class, attended the Heritage workshop in Fargo, and attended a Zoom meeting hosted by the General Society about ideas and education.

# **Juniors Report**

# MEET PILGRIM THOMAS ROGERS

Thomas Rogers and his son Joseph, age about 17, were passengers on the Mayflower.

Thomas was born at Watford, Northampton, England, circa 1572, the son of William and Eleanor (---) Rogers. He died at Plymouth, in the general sickness of the first winter of 1620/21. Thomas married at Watford, 24 October 1597, Alice Cosford. Alice was baptized at Watford, 10 May 1573, the daughter of George and Margaret (---) Cosford. It is likely that she died in Leiden as there is no evidence that she emigrated to Plymouth. The last mention of her is in the 1622 poll tax at Leiden where she is mentioned with children, Elizabeth, Margaret and John Rogers, who were all in a house for "poor people." In the same household is found Elizabeth Turner whose father and two brothers were passengers, with all three dying the first winter. Interesting to note that Elizabeth Turner also came over from Leiden so it is likely she came over with the Rogers children. It is likely that when the Rogers children came over from Leiden, their mother was then deceased.

by 1617 when he purchased a house there. The family made the choice that only Thomas and son Joseph would travel on the Mayflower; when they were settled, Alice and the remaining children would come over. Unfortunately, with Thomas' death just a few months later, there was no home for them to go to.

Thomas was a signer of the Mayflower Compact, while the ship was at the Provincetown Harbor, on 11 November 1620. In the 1623 land division, Joseph Rogers received two acres, one for himself and another for his father. In the 1627 cattle division, Joseph is in the group headed by William Bradford. It is likely that when his father died that first winter, Bradford took him in.

In 1636, Joseph Rogers operated a ferry over Jones River, near his dwelling house and he charged one penny per

person. In 1639, Joseph is called "of Duxbury" when he was named as a surveyor of highways; at the same court, his brother John became a freeman. The brothers were sometimes mentioned together, as in 1640 when they were granted 50 acres. In 1647, Joseph was appointed Lieutenant in Eastham, "to exercise their men in armes."



Bradford's history states that Thomas Rogers' other children came over, married and had many children. John Rogers has been identified, which means Elizabeth and Margaret Rogers likely came over with their brother, perhaps around 1629/30 (when some of the remaining family members in Leiden were brought over), however they have not yet been identified in Plymouth.

Children of Thomas and Alice Rogers: (baptized at Watford)

Thomas Rogers, baptized 24 March 1598/99; buried at Watford 27 May 1599.

[possibly] Richard Rogers, baptized 12 March 1599/1600; buried at Watford 4 April 1600.

Joseph Rogers, baptized 23 January 1602/03; died at Eastham, between 2 January and 15 January 1677/78; married before 16 August 1633, wife unknown; his 1678 will mentions wife Hannah; he had eight children: Sarah, Joseph, Thomas, Elizabeth, John, Mary, James and Hannah Rogers.

John Rogers, baptized 6 April 1606; died at Duxbury, between 26 August 1691 and 20 September 1692; married at Plymouth, 16 April 1639, Anna Churchman; they had four children: John, (H)anna, Abigail and Elizabeth Rogers. John came over from Leiden and first shows up in Plymouth in the 1633 tax list.

Elizabeth Rogers, baptized 26 Dec 1609; no further record. Elizabeth came over from Leiden; and it has been suggested that she may have married Samuel Eddy [who had many children] but further investigation is needed.

Margaret Rogers, baptized 30 May 1613; no further record. Margaret came over from Leiden and likely married and had children.
